Your Customizable Virtual Event Technology Packing List

Hosting a <u>virtual or hybrid event</u> can be a lot like packing for a trip – you need to make sure you have everything in your suitcase before you get going. But making sure you have the right technology can be hard, especially when you also have to coordinate speakers, an auction, and more. Network for Good's partner <u>The AV Department</u> has compiled technology packing lists for your next event, no matter how large or sophisticated it is.



Packing List For any planner, emcee or live presenter

1. A Computer - Use a computer (desktop or laptop) built in the last 2-3 years. Make sure you restart it before using it for a livestream, disable notifications, meet The AV Department in a virtual meeting (Zoom or other), and walk through the proper steps for virtual set up with one-on-one guided support. Everything you've worked so hard on is going to go through this device, then to your production partner and shown around the globe, so make sure it's ready for the spotlight.

2. A Camera - You can purchase a nice 1080p resolution web-cam for around \$50 that can hook into your computer with a USB cable. Don't plan on using your device's built-in camera or your cell phone camera.

3. A Microphone Package - Support your local music store! You can purchase a microphone under \$100. Anything will be better than your phone or built in computer mic. Also, consider an interface

like a Focusrite Scarlett to allow a microphone to properly hook up to your computer, and an XLR cable to connect the microphone to that interface. All of this will cost around \$300 - but when you go on a trip, you want to have the best luggage and gear to make you comfortable, right?

4. The Internet (+ ethernet CAT cable) -

Make sure you have good internet speeds. Type in "internet speed test" in google, or go to www.fast. com, run the test, and make sure your UPLOAD speed is higher than 6, and preferably higher than 10 mbs. You can ask your local internet provider to boost your internet speed at home or at the office during the month of your live show. It is like purchasing travelers' insurance for a trip abroad!

5. Device #2: A laptop or tablet - How do you perform in front of the camera, interact with other speakers, monitor the chat, refer to auction pricing, AND read your script? A second device!

Your first device, the computer you're packing for the trip, should be dedicated to receiving your audio, video, and internet. Once logged in with The AV Department, you will be able to see and hear them in a video caller software (like Zoom). You'll also need to see your run of show, talking points, maybe some Q&A info that is being fed to you, and most importantly, Network for Good's event page. Use the second laptop to open all of the documents and more simplex websites that don't take up a lot of internet bandwidth. The AV Department's director will communicate with you on the device hooked up to your camera - this is how you will be cued to go live and begin speaking to your audience. The second device should be somewhere close to your camera so your eyes don't stray too far from the audience as you read your script or recognize donors. You want a seat with a best view on this train!



Train 2: Studio Train, A Family Trip

A few more members of your planning family are coming along for the ride, but less techy stuff needs to be packed.



Packing List

1. A studio - A studio is a perfect way to let the audio, video and virtual proessionals take care of everything for you. Your packing list will be smaller but may need some extra helping hands to make the trip fun and successful. First up, personal computers. Cameras, microphones, internet - the studio should have all of that. What you need is the things you have already created; your script, maybe a run of show document, the device that is already recognized with your Network for Good log-in. Plan on bringing your organization's family along to help carry the load.

2. A computer - Bring a personal computer with your script on it and bring a helper from your organization to scroll the script for the teleprompter. You'll be shown how to use a remote or mouse wheel during rehearsal -- easy stuff!

3. A team member to help with your auction

- Bring along someone on your team familiar with the auction items to monitor their progress in the software and update your benefit auctioneer for live updates. Want to learn more about how to host a successful fundraising auction? Check out Network for Good's blog **here**.


4. A team member to help with technology

- Bring a tech support helper. Offer their phone number on your Network for Good event page or website for folks who may be new to Network for Good, or virtual auctions in general. There are those that may not be used to entering their credit card online or timid about jumping into the chat. Supplying a phone number can mean supplying them with the means to donate and participate. This is a family trip after all - come along for the ride!
